Head Teacher's Comment

The recent interim assessment of Hitchin Boys' School by Ofsted concluded that our performance since the last inspection has been of sustained high quality and that there is therefore no need to proceed with a full inspection at this stage. The earliest we would now expect a full inspection would be Summer 2015.

Just a couple of months ago, in February, the school also received a letter of congratulation from the Minister of State for Schools, the Rt Hon David Laws MP, on the excellent GCSE performance of students in 2013. The results for the number of pupils achieving five or more A*-C grade GCSEs, including English and maths, puts Hitchin Boys' in the top 100 performing non-selective state funded schools in England.

These announcements provide continuing evidence of the outstanding work happening here at Hitchin Boys' School. This is fundamentally a testament to the exceptional commitment shown by staff to help the boys achieve their potential. It also recognises the excellent partnership between our parents, governors, staff and boys which means that Hitchin Boys' School continues to progress and build on our recent success.

Year 10 Geography trip to Dorset

The 2014 Dorset trip took place on the Bank Holiday weekend this year for the first time in eight years.

Seventy-five Year 10 students signed up to learn additional details of four key case studies for the coastal zone module. These included learning about the coastal protection methods used at Milford-on-Sea, the development of coastal land forms at Lulworth Cove, gathering data on Chesil Beach for a mock controlled assessment and finally learning how a sand dune ecosystem develops and how this fragile environment is protected. 
