Head Teacher's Comment

We are now at the end of 14 weeks of school and there are around 23 weeks left this year unless you are in an exam class when there are only 14 weeks or less remaining for some. It is now time to take stock of what has been achieved so far since September. Has your son done his best or could he try even harder in January? Is he clear about the progress he has made and how to ensure that continues or improves after Christmas?

I would particularly like to draw your attention to the launch of our Twitter feed at <u>www.hitchinboys.co.uk</u>. Several departments are using Twitter as an additional means of communication. We were grateful to note in our recent parent surveys the appreciation for the continued improvement in home-school communication. This is another resource on which many parents have commented positively.

We have been evaluating the quality of the boys' experience this half-term and it has been a very rewarding and stimulating activity. For instance, in a truly inspiring learning walk just the other day I saw a wonderful range of topics being explored, including: the process and the ethical dilemmas of chroniol villus/amniocentesis testing; the definitions of comets, asteroids and moons; the sub-ducting movement of tectonic plates; the damage caused by a "lahar" following a volcano; the nature of the rocks underlying Barton Hills and their likely sources; how to use database programmes. Indeed, in one particular lesson yesterday I saw this challenging and moving title on the board: "Why is the Earth here ?"

On the other hand, the extra-curricular aspects of school are superb. Our outstanding Music department was again showcased at this time of year in both the November Remembrance events and this month's Christmas celebrations. A constant reminder of how much there is to be proud of in this school.

In addition, our main Celebration of Achievement Evening, which took place last week, featured great musical performances against a backdrop of outstanding art work from the older students. Great achievement comes from great effort – and we celebrated the great achievements of over 100 students throughout 2013-14, noting in particular that over a third of the year group gained more than $5A^*/A$ grades at GCSE.

Finally, a word about the 6th Form, who face mock exams as soon as they return from the holidays: make sure you have a plan in place for revision; not every hour of every day, not left until the 2nd January, but a balance between enjoying the festive family season and making the most of this attempt to demonstrate your learning so far. A frequent and regular couple of hours on every spare day during the break is better than 10 hours the day and night before the exams. These are some of the most important milestones in your time in the 6th Form so plan for them.

In the meantime I wish you all a relaxing Christmas break and a very happy start to the New Year.

This term has seen the start of a Business Mentoring scheme, which has been designed to aid pupil progression through KS4 and KS5 with the aim of:

- increasing pupil's self-esteem and self-confidence;
- improving motivation to learn;
- improving personal and social skills;
- improving employability chances.

This scheme allows pupils to be provided with advice that takes a different viewpoint to that of a teacher or a parent/guardian, and gives pupils the opportunity to understand and know where they want to be at the end of the year, how they are going to get there and how to achieve their career path ambition.

To date, after a successful launch at the Priory Hotel, Hitchin, where the pupils were introduced to their mentors over a business breakfast, the scheme involves 30 pupils from KS4 and 5.

Free School Meals and Half Fare Bus Travel

The Government gives money to schools to help children from lower income families. This funding is called the 'Pupil Premium'.

For every child registered, Hitchin Boys' School gets \$935 this year.

HBS will only receive this money for those boys who have been registered as eligible for Free School Meals. It is therefore important that, in order for the School to receive this additional funding, all those who think they might be eligible apply as soon as possible. Boys who receive Free School Meals have £2.20 automatically credited to their Smart Card each day.

If you receive one of the benefits listed below your child may be eligible for free school meals:

- Income Support.
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance.
- Income-related Employment Support Allowance.
- Child Tax Credit (providing you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190).
- Pension Credit (Guarantee Credit).
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.

You may apply online at <u>www.hertsdirect.org/freeschoolmeals</u> or by phoning 0300 123 4048.

Students aged 11 to 18 and resident in the administrative county of Hertfordshire can apply for a **Hertfordshire SaverCard which enables them to travel for half the adult fare at all times on local bus services.** Those students without a valid Hertfordshire SaverCard will be charged the full adult fare. The cards run for the academic year and are valid until the 30th of September. There is a charge per paper application of £20 (forms are available in Reception) but online applications cost just £15. Please visit www.hertsdirect.org/savercard for more information. Families on low income may qualify for one Hertfordshire SaverCard free of charge each academic year. These applications should be made through the 'How can we help?' team. Please telephone 0300 123 4048 for further information.

Remembrance Events at HBS

Students at Hitchin Boys' School commemorated the start of the First World War during the first week of November with two separate events. An evening of music and drama was held on Tuesday November 4, to which all were invited. Then on Friday November 7, there was a programme for students throughout the day, which included a talk by military historian Andrew Spooner, a visit from Paralympic former soldier Derek Derenalagi and a Service of Remembrance at St Mary's Church.

The Tuesday evening event, 'Lest We Forget', took place at 7pm in the school's Main Hall and featured a variety of poems, readings and musical items from the school's talented music and drama students, including songs from 'Oh! What a Lovely War'. The evening concluded with the reading of the Roll of Honour and the Last Post being played. Director of Music Anne-Marie Hetherington explained: "We chose music composed during or inspired by the Great War and tried to capture some of the experiences of those who fought and who were affected."

On Friday, the focus of the Centenary commemoration looked back on the experiences of those involved in both the 'Great War' and in a modern conflict. All students were involved in two assemblies within school - the first with military historian Andrew Spooner, who discussed the experiences of soldiers in the trenches during the First World War, and the second with former soldier Derek Derenalagi, who talked about his experiences as a soldier in the Afghanistan war and life after it, as well as his recent involvement in the Paralympics.

To end the week, two Remembrance Services took place at St Mary's Church, one for the Upper School and one for the Lower School. During the rest of the day, teachers focussed on war-themed activities in their classes. Head of History Michael Philippou commented: "The centenary gave us an opportunity to reflect on the sacrifices made by the great men of our armed forces both then and now and, in our way, to thank them for all they have done for us."

Inner Drive Workshop




U13

At the BRE (British Research Establishment), students toured the Innovation Park and had the opportunity to explore several sustainable buildings, including the Eco House, Green House, Cub House, Renewable House and The Prince's Natural House plus an Adaptable Health Centre. The buildings were built or "assembled" using many innovative low carbon materials and technologies, demonstrating sustainability in action.

After the BRE, students enjoyed a short trip to the NHM to see the new

Stegosaurus and other highlights.
