Charity Challenges galore!

Several members of staff have undertaken charity challenges over the last half-term. Food Technology teacher Mrs Kavanagh (right) took part in the Moonwalk in Edinburgh in June, raising around £1,000 for breast cancer research with her sister.

Also in June, Head Mr Brown (middle right) completed three endurance events to raise over £1,800 through online sponsorship for Macmillan Cancer Support, the school's chosen summer charity.

On Sunday 21st June Mr Dawson and Mr Kelly (below right) joined six friends from their former footballing days to cycle from London to Brighton in aid of the British Heart Foundation the 40th anniversary of the event.

There were over 20,000 fellow cyclists on the 54 mile route, and in total their group raised £513 for the British Heart Foundation. It is hoped HBS Staff will enter the 41st running of the event next year.

Musicians have continued to make a real contribution to music in Hitchin. The Jazz Band were invited to play at St. Mary's Church in June, as part of a black tie fundraising dinner, complete with smoke machines and laser light displays. The Jazz Band also performed at the Summer Ball; special thanks to Tim Cranfield for organising that and also to Tom Addison, who provided live solo performances later in the evening. UCAS Convention and Apprenticeship Day

On Monday 29th June, Year 12 took a trip to Ware for the UCAS Higher Education Conference. For many of us this was an exciting prospect as it signified the start of a new path into Higher Education.

A wide range of Universities were represented by stands there, as well as many companies offering apprenticeships. The stands allowed us to have lengthy discussions with current students and lecturers about what was offered at each placement; for example, one student who was in her second year at Newcastle University encouraged me to visit the University despite me having previously ruled it out as an option.

At each stand prospectuses were given out with detailed information on every course offered. This was particularly helpful as it meant we had time later on to consider or rule out placements, and it also provided contact information if we had any questions about the placement. The convention also offered talks on various aspects of universities and apprenticeships, including university life, student finance and the



application process. These talks highlighted the amount of support available to all applicants and how the process can be made simpler for everyone.

The advantage of this convention was that those who were unsure of which direction to take in future were certainly much more able to make a decision by the end of the day. For those students who knew they were not looking at University as an option, an apprenticeship day (left) was held back at Hitchin Boys' School that included a presentation from Audi in Hitchin and also North Herts College. 

Our 1st XI were again invited to the annual invitational T20 Tournament at St Albans School, involving top private cricketing schools in the country. They produced some outstanding cricket to finish 3rd overall, beating Bedford Modern

School in the 3rd/4th place play off in a competition of eight teams. This was a significant improvement on last year when we finished 7th. Ben Cowell, with 161 runs in four games and 7 dismissals as wicket keeper was outstanding. He was ably supported by Nick Timm with 94 runs and economical bowling, while Charlie Jupp was the leading wicket taker with 8 wickets. Dan Cowell again captained the side with intelligence and enthusiasm, setting attacking fields and leading positively throughout.

Last season we introduced a new award for the Most Valuable Cricketer in the school based on a points system for runs scored, wickets, catches and stumpings taken.

An exciting contest this year went down to the last game of the season, and many congratulations to Elliott Beard in Year 7 - this year's winner with 527 points, with outstanding bowling figures of 7-12 in the District Cup Final. He was closely followed by Leighton Gibbs with 525 and William Guest in third with 427, who both had outstanding seasons too.

Stand out performers in Year 7 were Elliott Beard 247 runs and 25 wickets, Leighton Gibbs 345 runs and

16 wickets, and William Guest with 362 runs and leading run scorer in the school. Harry Gates took 21 wickets, ably supported by Finn Norrington, Lewis Drummond and Henry Brown, who took a remarkable six stumpings in the District Final. In the Year 8 team Ben Guest recorded 189 runs and 8 wickets, while Tom Hendry and George Crouch with 113 runs and 7 wickets were key figures, with James Redmond showing great progress and Daniel Brooks taking 13 wickets with his leg spin. Connor Dudley (92 runs), Sam Bellinger and Will Stewardson (103 runs and tidy work behind the stumps again) performed well for the Year 9s with Theo Reintjes making impressive progress as an opening bowler and Fran Shilton improving in all areas of the game. The Year 10 side were led well by Ben Wilmot (103 runs) and Harry Lanyon (99 runs and 7 wickets), again with good all round performances, and Elliott Willoughby improved greatly as a bowler.

Throughout the winter we plan to further develop and challenge our High Performance Cricketers by once again providing them with individual and team based scenarios in the form of personalised net sessions, a 'Hit Squad' with bowling machine drills,

The achievements listed below don't express the hard work and dedication our athletes have shown this season or the fantastic work displayed in curriculum lessons and extracurricular clubs by our pupils.

English Schools 2015

Three of our best athletes competed for Hertfordshire earlier in July in Gateshead at the English Schools Athletics Championships. In front of very large crowds and the nation's media they competed against the best other young athletes from all over the country.



George Marvell (Year 11, above centre) produced his best hammer throw of the year and a lifetime best of 68.42m to become Intermediate Boys English Schools Champion. George was been selected to represent England against the other home nations in Scotland the following weekend.


Key Stage 3 Extended Learning - Crest Award

House Forensic Science Day - CSI: HBS

The investigators carried out several practicals which enabled them to eliminate the suspects. Activities included chromatography, urine testing, hair analysis, blood sampling and liver investigation. A great time was had by all and three house teams discovered the culprit!

Police Lieutenant Horatio Caine awarded house points after each activity, judging observation, accuracy, elimination, awareness and data results.

The final scores were: Radcliffe 78 points, Mattocke 63, Pierson 42 and Skynner 33.Well done to our young Forensic Scientists!

STEM Food Tech trip to Jamie Oliver's Recipease

On Monday 29th June, 31 boys from years 7-10 enjoyed the Food STEM trip's second opportunity to visit Jamie Oliver's 'Recipease' this year. The day started with the boys making a hearty breakfast of pancakes with bacon or maple syrup or a selection of fresh fruit, breakfast muffins and berry fruit and banana smoothies at school, before setting off just after 9am for the Portobello Whole Foods Market in Notting Hill, an eco-minded chain with natural and organic groceries and houseware items. The boys had the opportunity to watch and taste food demonstrations, with tempting freshly cooked foods such as artisan breads, unusual cheeses, Asian foods, and spicy chilli sauces.

After the 'Whole Foods' shopping spree, we took a short walk to 'Recipease' in Notting Hill Gate. The boys were greeted with a video link from Jamie Oliver himself, passing on his wishes that the boys enjoy their cooking experience that afternoon in his workshop kitchen. Firstly, the boys were delighted to be able to make and decorate their own chocolate lollipops. Whilst these were chilling, the boys avidly watched the step by step demonstration on making fresh pasta, which they duly followed to enable them to make their own lunch, consisting of a summer broad bean and pea filled pasta, with a choice of garlic and chilli flavourings, tossed in a garlic and herb butter. The boys made their own pasta into raviolis and pasta shapes with such concentration and attention to detail, it was an



absolute delight to witness. They were able to sit down and eat their hard-earned lunch by about 2.15pm.

By 3.15pm it was unfortunately time to leave and return to school from another successful trip to Jamie Oliver's, with all thoroughly enjoying the day. "Recipease" have since emailed me, stating "what a pleasure the boys had been, and how their behaviour was exemplary and a credit to the school too" and that they were looking forward to the next time we take another group of our boys. 

Year 10 Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) Careers afternoon

On Tuesday 7th July, around ninety Year 10 pupils took part in a STEM Careers afternoon. They enjoyed five presentations from scientists and engineers from across industry and at a variety of career stages. The afternoon started with Mike Hann, who is Principal Scientific Investigator at GlaxoSmithKline. Mike spoke about his long career and current work in Science, and spoke about broader themes of developing a career and working at the edge of your knowledge. Alistair Southward, who works as a Development Chemist at Johnson Matthey, spoke about his work designing and commissioning new equipment and working practices, including a new

multimillion pound furnace. Lewis Gibbs bravely volunteered to demonstrate the heavy duty protective equipment that Alistair sometimes has to wear for 4-5 hours a day while working on the furnaces. Alistair also spoke about how he chose where to apply for university, taking into account more than just the subject. Humza Chandna, a current part-time A-level student at HBS who is also working part-time as a Research Assistant at the University of Hertfordshire, spoke about his current work on medical projects, and his GCSE and A-level years. The afternoon concluded with two scientist/engineers with a long career in the field. John Cooper, a regular supporter of the HBS Science Department, spoke on his work at Xerox on the development of photocopier technology, and Ian Mutton spoke about his extensive work with chromatography at

GlaxoSmithKline. The pupils joined the Science department in thanking all of our speakers for their time in coming to speak at the event, and broadening their horizons on the wide opportunities available in the STEM field.


