
Head Teacher's Comment

It has been a busy few weeks so far. I am writing to you after an inspiring morning assembly focused on Black History Month, in particular promoting both diversity and equality in our community. It was an absolute joy to see the "Selfie Hashtag" competition in which numerous students from all year groups came together to invent a meaningful slogan to symbolise the concepts of equality and diversity at HBS - the results can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

The Parents' Society have already been hard at work arranging events for the year, starting with a hugely attended barbecue for new Year 7 parents. Please do sign up to help them carry on their great work raising extra money for the boys.

Our Open Days and Evening were as usual extremely positive occasions and we welcomed over 700 people during the course of the two days. (As usual the single most common question was about admissions, as we are of course sadly always over-subscribed. Meetings have taken place with Herts County Council about expansion for the future, but this will not be until 2018 at the earliest.)

We have also been lucky enough to see the return of our Composers' Concert, organised by Mrs Strachan and the Music Department, which was a superb and eclectic joy. There have also been many sporting events, Duke of Edinburgh Gold and Bronze expeditions and lots of other work done to get the new year underway as effectively as possible. In summary then, an exciting half-term with lots happening to remind us that HBS is a great place to learn.



The vital first steps were to look at definitions of British values. The government describes them as:

All forms in years 10 and 11 did an activity in small groups to help them to think and understand the importance of British values. They had to speak about the values above, imagining that they were explaining them to someone who

had never been to Britain before. They discussed issues such as how do we expect people to behave? (e.g. manners, queuing); what rules do we have in Britain? What about rules over religion or beliefs?

Boys were interested in the subject and shared thoughtful comments, such as: "We believe in British values. We believe in freedom of speech. We get on with everyone regardless of their religion or background. We believe in the right to vote. We believe that British values should include the opportunity to have a cup of tea, scones and jam, a bacon butty, crumpets, a pint of lager or bitter. We respect the Queen. We have the right to go to church if we want to or to follow which ever religion we want. We respect the laws of the land."

Mobile Phones - a reminder for parents

Mobile phones can be a distraction in lessons and around the school.

Mobile phones can make boys more at risk of being victims of crime.

Mobile phones can be used as a means of intimidating others by sending inappropriate messages and taking photographs or videos without permission. For all these reasons we discourage boys from bringing mobile phones into school.

However, we also realise that many parents need their sons to have access to a mobile phone before and after school as a means of communication. Therefore, whilst we advise parents not to allow their sons to carry such devices to school, if such devices are brought in, they must be switched off and in a bag at all times during the school day; this includes moving between lessons, break and lunchtime.

There are no exceptions to this rule for Years 7-11. Sixth Formers may use mobile phones within the Sixth Form Centre Common Room only – in all other areas they are expected to set an appropriate example for younger students by NOT using their phones in public.

The only exception to the above will be if a member of staff authorises the use of such devices in a lesson to support the learning in the classroom - for example, to photograph a finished product in order to upload the image for the purposes of coursework or to conduct necessary research.

If teachers see students using their mobile phone, they will confiscate it and give it to their Head of Year, who will give it back at the end of the day. If this happens too many times, we will ask you to come to collect it.

Improving communication with parents and carers

We are currently implementing a new system, SIMS InTouch, which will allow us to communicate with parents/carers via text message or email and offer some additional benefits over the current system. SIMS InTouch will replace our current Parentmail 2 system by the end of 2015. There may be some duplication of messages initially as we will use both systems until all year groups are switched over.

We will be able to share electronically with you information about your child's achievements (including progress check reports) and behaviour, alerts if your child is not in school, and reminders about parent evenings and other school meetings. You will also be able to respond to the message by replying to the text or email or by telephoning the school.

There is no separate registration process needed for SIMS InTouch, as we will use the email address and mobile number that we currently hold in our database for each student's Priority 1 contact. If you wish a second contact to also receive messages via InTouch, then please let us know through the method below.

If you do change your contact details at any time during the year, please let the school know as soon as possible (you can do this via our school website using the 'General Enquiry' form on the Contact Us page). The details you provide will be kept private and used for school business purposes only. If you have any queries, please contact the school on 01462 432181.

Duke of Edinburgh Award update

This year has started off with a bang for the Duke of Edinburgh Award at Hitchin Boys' School. Within the first six weeks we have had over 50% of Year 10 start their Bronze Award journey. 67 boys from Years 11 and 12 accomplished their Bronze qualifying expedition which sees the completion of their award after a year of hard work volunteering within the community and developing both physical attributes and individual skills. IN addition, 13 boys from Years 12 and 13 started their Gold Award and completed their practice expedition in the Black Mountains of Wales!! The expedition section at all levels of the award provides a great challenge and this couldn't



have been truer for those boys at Gold level. As two teams they negotiated their way across unforgiving terrain from the North to the South of the Black Mountains over 4 days/3 nights carrying personal kit and food for the entire trip as well as their tents and cooking stoves. The boys showed resilience and strength and gained a sense of achievement in a way that some had not felt before. On the last morning, after walking in two teams for the past few days the boys united as one team and woke in the dark to climb to the top of the closest peak to watch the sun rise. D of E is all about taking yourself out of your comfort zone and embracing opportunities that come your way. This couldn't be truer for a number of the boys on this trip and when they reached the top the view was breath taking and will be something the boys will not forget.

Science Department News

CREST Award for the Science Department

Our Science Department has just been awarded a CREST Teacher Recognition Award for their hard work supporting CREST awards over the past year. The certificate is one of only 300 presented to teachers from across the UK this year.

The British Science Association runs the CREST scheme, a programme for young people, providing science enrichment activities to inspire and engage 5-to-19-year olds. It is the only nationally recognised accreditation scheme for project work in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) subjects. CREST gives pupils the chance to participate in hands-on science through investigations and enquiry-based learning.

Activities organised by the Science Department at HBS over the last year have included a Year 7 STEM Science Club, a Rocket Club, and extended learning projects for Key Stage 3 pupils which lead towards CREST Bronze awards.

Mr Warman runs KS3 Rocket Club on Tuesdays after school. Students who attended the Club last year and gained a Bronze Crest Award are now working towards a Silver Crest Award. This entails 30 hours of project work, Silver Awards stretch students to develop their own project idea - they are encouraged to lead it and use their teacher as a sounding board for discussions. Students are also expected to consider the wider impact of their project, demonstrate an innovative approach and produce a project report of evidence to present to their Crest Assessor. 
offering support and advice on the projects.

HBS swimmers thrash Divisional record!

Friday 9th October saw a remarkable evening for four Hitchin Boys' School swimmers at the Eastern Region Divisional Secondary Schools relay championships held at Woodside Pool in Watford.

The medley relay saw the senior boys team of Matthew McPherson, Alex Evens, Sam Gamble and Luke Turley crowned Hertfordshire Schools champions, taking third place in the Eastern region.

However, it was in the freestyle relay that everything came together. A time of 1.39.40 not only saw them being crowned Eastern Division champions, but they also thrashed the previous record of 1.41.77. This record had been held for over ten years by Harrow School and now places the school team in the top six schools nationally for freestyle relay.

Head of PE Chris Pugh said: "This is a tremendous achievement for four completely dedicated swimmers. To be crowned Eastern Division champions is an achievement in itself, but then to break the record by so much is the icing on the cake. We are now looking forward to the National Finals in November with great anticipation."

Year 12 Report

In this first half term Year 12s have had multiple extra-curricular activities to get involved in and to help them with school work. During one September assembly a team of people from the National Citizen Service (NCS) came into school and gave a talk about what NCS is. Students had an opportunity to sign up for it over a half-term, and a number did as it helps both the local community and also supports future applications.

All three secondary schools in the consortium also went to an afternoon 'Learn 2 Live' presentation recently. Luke Crabtree of Year 12 writes: 'The lower years may not be aware,

but recently AS students went to the Gordon Craig theatre to watch a presentation run by the organisation 'Learn 2 Live'. This is an initiative informing 16 to 17 years olds about the dangers and responsibilities of learning to drive and being a young driver. The presentation had speakers from our local Road Safety Team, Fire and Rescue service, Police, Paramedics and family members that have been affected. One particular story featured a father who had lost his daughter to a car accident, which could have been avoided by taking proper care; this story brought many people to tears. Overall, the entire experience was thought-provoking as it gave a valuable insight to the dangers faced by all road users.'

Another assembly was from the Samaritans, telling us that we can talk to them if we are struggling with any problems in life. This was a very helpful assembly and certainly showed us that there is a lot of support out there, not just in school.

Approximately 25 Year 12s (including myself) took part in the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh expedition, which was an interesting experience and very different to anything else I would have done voluntarily. Later this week all Year 12s are participating in an Inner Drive workshop to try and help them learn how to use their brain more effectively and how to better manage any failures we may encounter.

Defibrillators donated to HBS

Hitchin Boys' School has been fortunate to receive two defibrillators recently - one kindly donated by Lynne Shoebottom, who lost her son, former HBS pupil Matthew, to Sudden Adult Death Syndrome (SAD) in 2010, and the other donated by local construction company Willmott Dixon.

If a person goes into cardiac arrest, a defibrillator can be used to try and restore the heart rhythm A

Year 8 Barton Hills Geography Trip

On Monday 28th and Tuesday 29th September, Year 8 travelled to Barton Hills National Nature Reserve (NNR) which is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI). We were there to study rock formations such as escarpments and other natural features. When we arrived, we split into groups and went to observe Barton Hills. We saw dry valleys, natural springs and escarpments. An escarpment is a rock formation, usually made of chalk, which consists of a gentle (dip) slope and a steep (scarp) slope. A natural slope forms when water flows out of a rock because it can't get through an impermeable rock beneath. At Barton this is clay and we looked at the differences in land use between the chalk and clay areas.

This trip was in preparation for our upcoming test and assessment this half term. All Year 8s took something away from this trip. We would like to thank the Geography department for arranging such a great trip.
