

Head Teacher's Comment

During this half-term there have been many and varied wonderful events, most of which you will find described in this packed newsletter. I would like to focus on one event in particular as I believe it has an important message for us all in these difficult times.

This year we held three assemblies in remembrance of those who lost their lives in the two World Wars, and indeed in the many conflicts since. As our guest speaker, Mr Andrew Parr, pointed out, there has only been one year since the end of the Second World War in which a British serviceman or woman has NOT lost their life in the service of their country. At the same time he talked about the grief of all who had lost family – on both sides of any conflict. We then held a minute of silence and the Last Post was played; a moment of deep remembrance which moved us all. We also held a minute of silence at 11:00 a.m. on the 11th November along with the rest of the country. This was an example of our strong connection with our heritage and commitment to our traditional values.

Sadly, in response to the loss of life in Paris on 13th November, we then felt it appropriate (and as requested by Government) to hold another minute of silence on the following Monday along with much of the country. In this season of goodwill therefore, we feel a strong desire to discuss some of the consequences of extremist behaviour.

All staff have recently been trained under the Government's new anti-extremism policy, "Prevent". This aims to educate staff and children to avoid extremist activity. Obviously, with recent news events fresh in our minds, the immediate assumption could be that this policy is directed at avoiding Islamic radicalisation.

In fact the policy is very explicitly about ALL FORMS of extremist behaviour and as a school, we also feel it is vital that we raise the issue with our community, of extremists targeting Muslims. There is a risk that our young people may hear confused and racist messages from our media, politicians and others who seek to incite hatred.

As a community we must assert the fact that all people have the fundamental right to their religious beliefs and their cultural identity. These are the British Values which we hold so dear.

We must help our young people realise that the murderers in Paris and the USA and on the streets of London and other major cities and resorts around the globe do NOT represent Islam. By doing so we can help ensure that their thinking is not tainted by the extremist far-right groups who seek to vilify and demonise all Muslims.

Not just at this time of year, but at all times, it is vital for the healthy mental development of our young people that we bring them up to be strong in their awareness of democracy, liberty, respect and tolerance.

I wish you all a peaceful and relaxing Christmas break and a great start to the New Year. Martin Brown



We started the half term with our Autumn Concert, in which all our school ensembles give their first public performance of the year. We had our first Soloists' Recital of the year in late November, where a group of performers take the opportunity to gain solo experience in an informal concert setting; it is a pleasure to see that the tradition of singing remains very strong and we witnessed some excellent vocal and instrumental performances from students in years 7-13.

In mid-November a small group of musicians performed in the town centre to raise money for Children in Need, supported by some very persuasive members of the Senior Prefect Team; they raised just under $\pounds 200$ by playing to the lunchtime passers-by. Continuing the theme of supporting charities, the Chamber Choir, Brass Group and Barbershop performed at the Christmas Fayre on 30th November, as the lights on the Christmas tree were switched on; it was a cold and windy performance but an enjoyable and very successful evening.

Science Department News

Science has had a busy half term with many activities and trips taking place. KS3 Rocket Club continues with students researching, modifying and collecting data for their STEM Award Projects. Rocket Club students went to The Hub Lecture Theatre in Milton Keynes for the Christmas Schools Lecture "A Room with a Boom", presented by the Royal Society of Chemistry.

The practical demonstration lecture gave pupils a fun afternoon with lots of bangs and whooshes. A big thankyou goes to Mr Warman, who runs Rocket Club supported by Claire Smith and John Cooper (STEM Ambassador).



Twenty seven Year 9 students went on a trip to the Natural History Museum then onto to Imperial College for the Children's Christmas Lecture.

Before the lecture, pupils visited the College's Fringe Event "It is Rocket Science", celebrating British Astronaut Tim Peake's imminent launch into space.



Pupils had the opportunity to talk to space scientists including Dr Helen Sharman, first Briton in space, plus hands-on research, create their own meteorite crashes, and much more.

Finally, the Children's Christmas Lecture "The Universe: A Journey through Space and Time" was presented by Dr Zita Martins. This whistle-stop tour through space and time included a close look at planets and moons across the solar system.

Tim Peake set off for the International Space Station this week and will spend six months there carrying out scientific experiments. He is the first British ESA (European Space Agency) astronaut to visit the Space Station. One of the educational projects being carried out is to "Grow Seeds that have been to Space", and turn pupils into "Space Biologists". Seeds have been sent to the International Space Station, and the project is giving schools the chance to grow the seeds in 2016, then compare them with seeds that have remained on earth. HBS have successfully applied and look forward to participating in the project at the start of the Summer term 2016.

Year 7 Science Club

Science Club continues with an enthusiastic group covering many different topics and hands on activities. Pupils have enjoyed building paper bridges and testing the strength of their designs, flame tests and separating.



Mr Merison organised a half term project to create a model of the earth for his Year 8 Class, showing the crust, mantle outer and inner layers. Reuben Holden (below) won the task and received a Head of Year commendation.



GeneratioNext - ROCHE

Roche recently organised the first ever Roche School Science Fair entitled "GeneratioNext – It's in your DNA". The event was for sixth form students interested in pursuing a career in science or the pharmaceutical industry. The day kicked off with an opening address from Professor Lord Robert Winston, who then spent time with the students, and was followed by three workshops covering Genetics, Diagnostics and Immunotherapy.

At the end of the day Roche held a quiz based around the day's events. HBS came second and received a $\pounds 250$ prize to spend on new science

Rugby Reports

Year 10 Rugby

This year the Year 10 rugby teams (below) had a good season, with some brilliant running rugby leading to some wonderful victories; however there were a few disappointing and nail biting defeats along the way.

Both teams started off with heavy defeats to County Champions St Georges, with the A team losing 54-12 and the B team losing 40-12; however, both teams then responded well with the B team beating Leventhorpe 36-15 and the A team beating UCS 27-17. Unfortunately after showing much promise in these victories the next two games resulted in loses against Haberdashers and Richard Hale as the A team lost 29-22, a feisty encounter, and 26-19. The B team lost 40-5 and 20-5.

After a couple of weeks to rest the A team replied with a thumping victory at Roundwood Park 72-0, which included some outstanding rugby, even with the weather suggesting running rugby was impossible as the rain lashed down. This result was then backed up well with another convincing victory, this time against Verulam with a 46-12 win. After these results, both team travelled to St Columba's full of confidence, only to both lose narrowly as the A team fell short 34-31, which was a valiant effort due to them having to play with 14 men for



the majority of the game due to an injury. The B team also unfortunately lost 24-22; however both these performances showed the progress the team had made throughout the season.

This led us onto the last game of the season where the A team faced Enfield, who were only able to field nine players, which gave our bench a chance to play for them. The end result finished 58-5, which meant that we ended on a high and a good way to end an enjoyable season.

Year 9 Rugby



The Year 9 rugby team (above) have had another impressive season and finished the season unbeaten. They played 12 games, scoring 610 points and only conceding five tries all season.

The season started with a comprehensive win against St Georges 64-0 in the County Cup, with Jai Johal impressing at fly half and the front row of Zac Whatling-Page, Harry Renner-Bennett and David Koffi doing lots of the hard unseen work.

Wins followed against Haberdashers and USC before facing Richard Hale in the next round of the County cup. Richard Hale have proved tough opposition in previous years but the defensive effort of the HBS team and their ability to keep the ball alive saw them comfortable winners 89-14. Alex Lloyd-Williams impressed in the back row - with his hard abrasive running and ability to turn the ball over at the breakdown, he would continue to be a constant threat all season.

The next round of the County Cup saw us make the trip to the impressive grounds of Bishop Stortford College. With full time grounds men and the choice of 20+ pitches, the players rose to the occasion and produced another fine display of attacking running rugby. Woody Garthwaite impressed with a fine display of counter attack full back play as did Aman Johal at centre, who distributes the ball very well, has a good eye for a gap and has found an extra yard of pace this season.

Another fine display followed against a strong Roundwood Park side, which contained five county

players. Playing on a smaller pitch in wet and soft conditions the team showed they could match any side physically; the 76-0 win doesn't reflect the physical nature of the game. Standouts included Jude Schoeman, Cameron Crowe and Tom Pook.

Next up was the semi-final of the County Cup against a highly rated Bishop Stortford High School side which had previously been unbeaten. Defence won the game and strong ball carries from Henry Bennet and David Koffi helped add to an impressive team display. Hitchin Boys' won the game 55-7.

Two further victories followed, against Verulam (33-0 with Alfie Smales coming up with a try of the season contender as he carried about six players with him over the try line), and St Columba's (66-0), which set up a County Final against a strong Verulam side under lights at Hertford in front of a big crowd. The half time score was Hitchin Boys 14 Verulam 12. With the wind behind us in the second half Verulam struggled with territory and amazing breakdown work from scrum half Ben Guest who managed three tackle jackal turnovers. Two bulldozing try-scoring runs from man of the match Henry Bennet and some dazzling footwork from Jean Claude Aka made the score line flatter us a little. A hard-fought, intense game finished 41-12 and the Year 9's were crowned Hertfordshire U14 County Champions.

Congratulations to Zac Whatling-Page and Henry Bennet who have been selected to represent Hertfordshire U14s, and also to Aman Johal, Jai Johal and Alex Lloyd-Williams, who have been selected to attend Saracens elite development training as well as being selected for Hertfordshire.

Orienteering

Year 8 student Alex Wetherill took part in a six-day orienteering competition in the Scottish Highlands during the summer holidays. Here is his account of the event:

"The Scottish six days is an orienteering competition, which happens every two years. This year the event centre was Inverness with all the races within an hour's drive out of the city. I was planning to race a class above me in M14A, to get practice on the harder courses for when I start doing them next year. In an orienteering race, you have to visit a number of controls on the course you must visit. At the start you are told the codes that will match the ones on the controls you must find, and you are given a blank map of the area where you will be orienteering to try and work out where the start is. Finally, when you hear a long bleep you pick up your map and run.

During the race, you 'dib' each control to prove you have found it. A dibber is an electronic device, which stores the time it took for you to reach each control and whether you found each one. If you don't find all the controls and the finish you will be disqualified.


The six days were full of tough competition, with some days easier than others. Overall I came 72nd in M14A, two years above me. I really enjoyed the event and I am looking forward to going back next year. It has given me a lot of practice on finding controls by using contours. I hope to finish in the top five at the British Championships and the JK (another race), in my age group."
