European Week of Languages: We have had European languages week with fun assemblies and activities in a range of foreign languages culminating in a marvellous European breakfast on Friday morning.

Open Day & Evening: Over two morning sessions and an evening the school has opened its doors to prospective parents hoping to join us in September 2014. Thanks to all the boys who acted as tour guides and helpers and gave a great impression of the school. Once again the main worry for parents was whether they would be successful in their applications. We would like everyone who wants to join us to be able to do so and we wish them all well.

Black History Month: We have also raised awareness of Black History throughout October with presentations and assemblies focusing on Martin Luther King, the Windrush Generation and questions about identity and multiculturalism. There have been quizzes, lunchtime activities and as an added bonus, we have had some excellent Caribbean and Indian food selections in the Dining Hall.

Shelter Box: We committed to raising money for the Shelter Box charity which provides life-saving shelter, cooking equipment and other essential supplies to families in refugee or crisis zones.



In the summer term the senior prefect team organised a fun run and non-uniform day and many forms invented their own fundraising activities. Last week we presented the cheque for £2,572 to Tile House Rotary Club who operate the scheme. This will purchase at least 4 Shelter Boxes – potentially saving the lives of 4 families in crisis, war or refugee zones around the world.

Winners Wall: Each half-term we will be celebrating outstanding work produced by some of our boys. Here are the first two entrants to Mr Brown's Winners' Wall. 
SAHARA TREK
